From the Archives

Scottish Folk Fabrics was established in 1920 in Ladywell Road by James Morton. The site is now occupied by Ladywell House and Ladywell Medical Centre (West).

James Morton (later Sir James) was born in Darvel, Ayrshire on the 23rd March 1867. His father Alexander founded the weaving company of Alexander Morton & Company. James trained as a chemist at Morton Sundour Mills in Carlisle where his family purchased Denton Mills.

While setting up a new dye factory in Grangemouth, James and his family lived in Edinburgh. He bought the Ladywell Road site from the owner of The Corstorphine



Estate to house small Handicraft Projects. This enterprise was run by Ronald Simpson. In the 1921 census, Ronald and his family are living in "Sunnybrae", Dovecot Road. A condition of the land sale was that the tenant, James Forrest, was to be compensated for "crop, manure, and labour".

Early products were: Torphyn hand-woven rugs, tapestries; high quality embroidery work; and the Panurge Company producing large scale stuffed felt toy animals - "beautiful horses, teddy bears and lambs". By the end of 1921, a show of products could be seen at Liberty and Company's London shop. At first, the operation was known as "The Huts" because the early buildings were army huts, but the Scottish Folk Fabric name was soon adopted. The site was surrounded by fields and the workers had a long walk to work until the tram line was extended to Corstorphine in 1923, the same year that an electricity supply reached the factory. During WW2, the factory made parachutes.

Sir James died in 1943 at Dalston Hall, Cumbria.

Maps Through Time



Changes in Corstorphine Shops and Businesses

A few local shops have changed or are changing. M. Gee convenience store (Hameeds), on the corner of Station Road and St. John's Road, has moved to 119b St Johns Road (formerly The Refillery). Many will remember they started around 2009 then, when the Post Office next to The Wee Shop closed on retiral of the owner, they incorporated the Post Office into their shop.

Across the road at the bottom of Clermiston Road, Philip Politi hairdressers' shop and Specialized Signs are vacant; Philip retired and Specialized Signs moved out to Newbridge. The estate agent sign has gone from Philip's old shop and workers have been doing some building work – so watch this space! On the corner of Kirk Loan, Porteous Family Funeral Directors have recently moved into the old Leslie Deans & Co, Leslie Deans & Co, Solicitors and Estate Agents (No 135-137).



Opposite the top of Manse Road, Pinkk hairdressers have moved out of No 140 St. John's Road. This has been acquired by Neilson's, so they now have the whole block here. Pinkk has moved into what was previously Zoe Brown, Nails (No 209). David R Murray & Associates, Consulting Engineers have vacated Nos 150-154 (next to St. Ninians), again a retiral – they have had an office in Corstorphine since at least 1986. Planning permission is in here to convert it to six holiday lets. Another shop vacated is Heaven Beauty, no 213 St. John's Road, it has recently

opened as Ember.co, a financial/accountancy firm.

On the corner of Featherhall Avenue and St. John's Road, The Centurion (since mid-1960s) changed hands recently and in now owned by Greene King; they have planning permission in to change the signage and rename it The Tarbet, a pub with "Great Beers, Live Entertainment, Live Events, Dart & Pool, TNT Sports, & Sky Sports!"

The old Neuk Post Office, which closed in January 2023, is currently getting shopfitting work done. This is going to be a convenience store called One Stop, a franchised subsidiary of Tesco, operated by private owners. Staying on old Post Offices, the Drum Brae Post Office, 26 Duart Crescent, which closed 2023, has just opened as a café, Urban Coffee.

As we go to print, Iceland, in Manse Road is closing; this shop first opened in a new building as Low Freeze around 1976, after the Astoria Cinema was demolished. Bejam was next here, around 1987, and after a buy out by Iceland in 1989, the Corstorphine shop was rebranded. Sadly, many non-profitable Iceland shops over the UK are in the process of closing.





The final shop to become vacant is Novella, Hairdressers, no 14 Glasgow Road. This has been a hairdresser since the 1970s - many will remember this as Turvey & Co, Hairdressers & wigs here until 2014.


